New Book from Dr. Briana Nelson Goff

[Dr. Briana Nelson Goff](#), professor in the conflict resolution and conflict analysis and trauma studies programs, wrote *['Bulletproof Vows: Stories of Couples Navigating Military Deployments and Life's Battles'](#)*, which was published in January 2023.

Dr. Goff studies trauma and PTSD among military personnel and their families. In the book, Dr. Goff tells the stories of eight post-9/11 Army couples who she interviewed initially in 2005 and then again in 2015. She depicts the experiences of these Army couples during the 10 years and describes their resilience.

Social Impact Lab

This spring we partnered with the Sociology, Anthropology, and Social Work department to host the [Social Impact Lab](#), a one-day camp for Kansas middle and high school students (grades 7 – 10) who are interested in career opportunities within various helping professions.

On April 14th, 78 middle and high school students from across Kansas were introduced to careers in helping professions, toured campus, met K-State faculty and students, and learned about the K-State college experience.

We greatly enjoyed having the students on campus and look forward to hosting the event again next year!



Microcredentials and Professional Certificates

We recognize that there are opportunities to reach learners in a variety of ways, not just in the college classroom. That's why we have partnered with K-State Global Campus to offer [microcredentials](#) as high-quality short courses.

The courses are taught by faculty in our department to individuals across the lifespan who are seeking more information on topics that will benefit them both personally and professionally. Learners also have the opportunity to earn continuing education hours for completion of the microcredentials.

Our department currently offers seven courses online as microcredentials: [Grant Development and Management](#), [Working with Older Adults in Cooperative Extension](#), and five courses that makeup the [Conflict Resolution Professional Certificate](#). Offering these microcredentials allows our faculty to provide relevant information to a wide range of learners.

Dr. Brett Mallon, teaching assistant professor in the conflict resolution program, shared, "We've worked to really tailor the courses to the specific needs and interests of each learner so that they aren't getting some nebulous academic experience, but from day one, they are getting practical knowledge and skills that apply directly to their lived experiences in their personal and professional lives."

A new undergraduate certificate in [Early Childhood Consultation](#) was launched this spring semester and is available to current students and non-degree seeking students.

Through this certificate students learn the unique characteristics of early childhood environments and how to support early childhood professionals through practice-based coaching. The 12 credit hour certificate consists of four courses that are all available online.

Rising Professionals Award

The College of Health and Human Sciences [Rising Professional Awards](#) honor significant contributions made by graduates in the early stages of his or her career. We were proud to recognize three alumni from programs in our department, Sarah Kuborn, Madison Parker, and Erika Smith-Marek.



Dr. Sarah Kuborn is an assistant professor and program coordinator of family studies at Southeast Missouri State University. As an undergraduate, she studied psychology, sociology, and religious studies. Sarah completed her Master's from K-State in 2015 and her Ph.D. in family studies, with a focus in human sexuality and family life education, in 2018. She also obtained a graduate certificate in gender, women, and sexuality studies in 2016. Since she began teaching as a Graduate Teaching

Assistant in 2013, she has been recognized for her outstanding teaching, both at the university and national level. She has taught 17 different courses over the past 10 years and has a hard time choosing her favorite, as she just loves teaching so much!

Throughout the years, Sarah has held many leadership and service roles. Nationally, she serves on the Certified Family Life Education Academic Review Committee. Additionally, she recently became Chair-Elect for the Family and Community Education section of the National Council on Family Relations. At her university, she is the chair of her college's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee and her department's Promotion and Marketing Committee. Her commitment to service and leadership was recognized in 2022, when she received the College of Education, Health, and Human Studies Faculty Service Award.

Sarah's passion for working with students is demonstrated through her work with the McNair Scholars Program, in which she mentors undergraduate students in their research and graduate school applications. She and her students have presented research at regional and national conferences. Some of her recent work has been published in the journal of Sexuality Research and Social Policy.

Dr. Erika Smith-Marek is a professor in the Department of Marriage and Family Sciences at National University. She is a Licensed Marriage and Family Therapist in Florida where she operates a private practice specializing in couples therapy and the treatment of trauma and Posttraumatic Stress Disorder.

She is an American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy Clinical Fellow and Approved Supervisor.



She is also a Certified Trauma Treatment Specialist through the Association of Traumatic Stress Specialists and an EMDRIA Approved Consultant and Certified Therapist in EMDR Therapy.

Her clinical and research interests converge around the treatment of trauma. She especially enjoys long-distance trail running and spending time at the beach with her family.

Erika graduated from K-State in 2015, receiving her Ph.D. in human ecology with a specialization in couple and family therapy.

Madison Parker graduated with her Bachelor of Science in human development and family sciences in 2019 with a secondary major in gerontology. She fell in love with aging studies while pursuing her undergraduate degree and then went on to graduate with her master's degree in gerontology in 2021.



While at K-State, some of Madison's experiences included being a member of Kappa Omicron Nu Honor Society, serving as a Gerontology Student Ambassador, and speaking on a student panel at the LeadingAge Kansas Workforce Conference.

Outside of school, she worked as a home health caregiver, special programs assistant at Meadowlark Hills with their memory and Parkinson's programs, and life enrichment assistant at Legend Senior Living.

During the last semester of her master's program, Madison participated in an NIH funded research project as a graduate

research assistant. This research project sought to validate an environmental assessment tool which could be used to create and remodel elder living environments to be more person-centered and to serve the unique needs of older adults living with dementia. Throughout this project, Madison worked under an elder care facility architect and the president of the Innovative Designs in Environments for an Aging Society institute, as well as conducted site visits to numerous Kansas nursing homes.

Upon graduating with her master's degree in gerontology, Madison moved back home to the Wichita, KS area and began her Administrator in Training program with Grace Team Services, a family-owned, rural-focused management company that provides support to 11 Kansas nursing homes. During her time in the AIT program, Madison served as the temporary administrator of a 45-bed skilled nursing facility in Winfield, KS before passing her licensing exam. She then became administrator of Wheat State Manor, a 65-bed skilled nursing facility in Whitewater, KS.

Madison is passionate about improving the lives of older adults and helping them to live their fullest lives no matter their age. She is also a strong advocate for person-centered care and culture change in nursing homes. She is thrilled to be leading an amazing team of staff toward the common goal of a person-centered, home-like environment as they provide the best care and quality of life possible to the residents they serve.
