It is directed to all building and construction professionals (e.g. architects, interior designers, engineers, developers, contractors) and virtually anyone concerned with housing design. The Fair Housing Guidelines can be complicated, and may raise questions for those who are not acquainted with the many problems that people with disabilities have in their daily lives at home.
